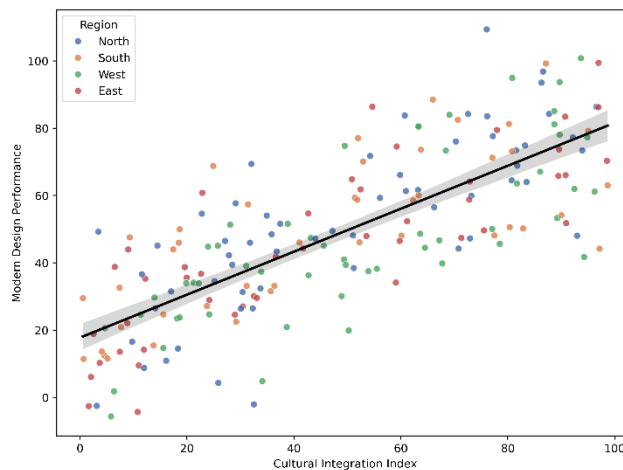


Figure 1 Cultural Index vs Modern Design Score

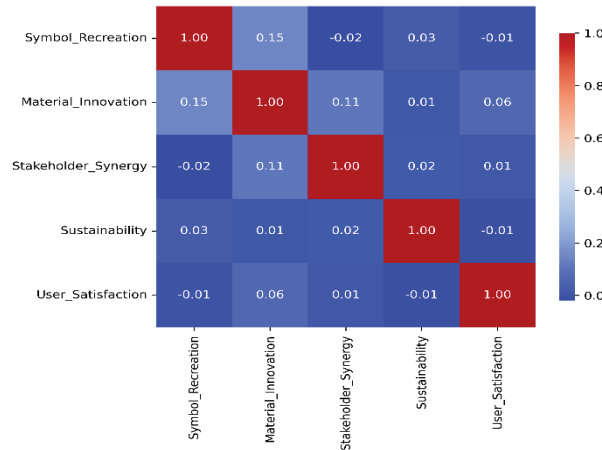


Figure 2 Heatmap of Innovation Mechanism Correlation
